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**TASTING NOTE:**

The 2015 Mysterious Diggings Pinot Noir is a classic example of a Pinot Noir made from a stunning vineyard and with a philosophy focused on provenance and terroir. The nose is fragrant and engaging with rustic red fruit and wild thyme. The now 16 year old vines combine with the sandier soils and higher elevation of the Mysterious Diggings vineyard to produce exceptional fruit with both depth of flavour and superb length. Silky tannins are reflective of the warm, dry summer and the balance and elegance speak of the lighter soils.

**CELLARING:** Instantly approachable. Drink now or cellar 1-5 years.

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**VINEYARD:**

Planted on a high, rocky outcrop, the Mysterious Diggings vineyard, planted in 1999 with five different clones, is one of the highest altitude vineyards in Bannockburn. With high elevation, steep slopes, multiple clones, original rootstock and sandy soils, it consistently produces elegant wines that are accessible and delicious at a young age.

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**VINTAGE:**

The 2015 Bannockburn season was one of the driest on record, creating perfect growing conditions. These ideal conditions, led to small berries, low yields, and an exceptionally concentrated body of fruit across all Terra Sancta vineyards. The heat and yield also contributed to a distinctive spice note from the skins.

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**VINIFICATION:**

Mysterious Diggings Pinot Noir is handled very gently in the winery to ensure the primary fruit flavors are preserved. Ageing in French oak barrels provides the wine with more structure and an inviting texture. The quality and purity of the fruit is reflected in this wine being bottled both unfinned and unfiltered.

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**FOOD & WINE:**

The concentrated fruit and elegant texture of this Pinot Noir lends it to lighter meat dishes such as pulled pork or a beetroot and lamb salad.
